After more than 30 years, the Regional Access Project (RAP) Foundation continues to deliver resources to address the unmet needs in the areas of Health, Mental Health and Juvenile Intervention of families to improve their quality of lives.

It has been my pleasure to serve as Board Chair this last year and feel honored to have been asked to continue on for another two-year term. Being a member of the board has provided me with the opportunity to serve as an ambassador of RAP to the community. I share information of the resources available to help strengthen nonprofits. As for what kind of resources, they vary from cash grants to capacity building services through our NPO Centric program, and nutrition education through our Coachella Valley Healthy Living program.

This past year, RAP took on a greater role beyond the Fourth Supervisorial District to administer the American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) Technical Assistance funds to nonprofits throughout Riverside County. ARPA provided additional resources to nonprofits to assist them in becoming more financially sustainable and addressed the increased needs resulting from the economic conditions caused by COVID.

Since RAP is serving a greater region, the number of team members has almost doubled this last year. Our two programs, NPOC and Coachella Valley Healthy Living, have grown with the support of the County of Riverside and through partnerships with local nonprofits to fill the gaps in services not provided by public entities. We are up to the challenge and looking forward to delivering the services to our partners to help them succeed in achieving their missions, thereby our communities benefit.



### Impact and Results

RAP utilizes proven evaluation methodologies to assess the impact of resources used to strengthen nonprofits endeavoring to address inequities in our diverse population. The Results Based Accountability (RBA) framework is used by RAP in making resource allocation decisions. A scorecard is used to effectively manage, aggregate, and communicate performance

measures across funded programs to assess if residents are better off—and how much better—as a result of resources being invested.



In the past year, we have continued to advance mental health services by improving access, enhancing cultural competency, and raising awareness. Our work, grounded in Results-Based Accountability (RBA), demonstrates both the reach and impact of our efforts. By closely tracking key performance indicators, we have been able to measure how our programs have positively affected individuals and communities.



#### **Expanding Access and Services**

One of the key successes has been our focus on improving access to mental health services in remote areas. Through innovative service delivery models, such as telehealth and mobile mental health services, we were able to provide care to 6,744 clients in rural and underserved regions in fiscal year 2024. This increase in access to care has been critical in addressing the unique barriers that individuals in these areas face.

#### **Client Outcomes**

Our efforts to improve the availability and accessibility of mental health services have resulted in 2,221 clients reporting positive outcomes as a direct result of improved access to services. These outcomes include better mental health, increased emotional wellbeing, and greater satisfaction with the care received. This data reflects the tangible difference that our services have made in the lives of those who may have previously been unable to access necessary support.

### Capacity Building and Cultural Competency

We have also made strides in ensuring that the services we offer are culturally sensitive and inclusive. Our work to train service providers in cultural competency has reduced language,

stigma, and cultural barriers, allowing more clients to receive care that is tailored to their unique needs. This focus has been essential in creating a more welcoming and accessible environment for underserved populations.

### Community Engagement and Awareness

Through extensive outreach campaigns, we have successfully increased awareness of mental health resources. These campaigns helped reduce stigma and inform the public about available services, ensuring that more individuals felt empowered to seek care. Our efforts to engage the community have been a key part of improving overall access to mental health support.

#### **Tangible Outcomes**

Using the Results-Based Accountability framework, we have been able to track and measure the real-world impact of our programs. By delivering mental health services to thousands of individuals and improving the accessibility of care, we are actively working toward better mental health outcomes across the populations we serve. Our data-driven approach ensures that we remain focused on delivering measurable, sustainable results.

### RAP Programs

**The NPO Centric Program** offers technical assistance to nonprofits to improve their capacity. NPO Centric provides the knowledge and professional skills necessary in the areas of planning, human resources, fund development, marketing, governance, etc. The capacity building service-delivery model includes offering monthly workshops, networking opportunities, one-on-one coaching/mentoring, and access to expert consultants, thereby allowing them to grow and better serve the needs of their clients.









### RAP Programs

**Coachella Valley Healthy Living** is made possible due to funding being provided by Riverside County University Health System- Public Health. This program allows us to partner with school districts, Boys and Girls Clubs, and public entities to deliver educational resources to improve health through nutrition and exercise. The program also aims to reduce tobacco use by youth.


