IYCCV prioritizes serving underserved communities, offering general classes for all levels of practice; adaptive classes for older adults and youth; and medical classes designed for residents recovering from cancer treatment, open-heart surgery, hip, and knee replacement, or an illness. Year-round classes offered in English and Spanish. The introduction of an online streaming component for the general classes expands accessibility, enabling students to join classes from their homes.
