The program assists patients with culturally competent behavioral health services. Routine assessments for social determinants of health (SDOH) are done for all new patients within 30 days of admission and for all former patients when requested. Patients complete anxiety (GAD 7) and/or depression (PHQ 9) questionnaires at each visit, and a MSW Social Worker attempts contact within one week. For patients whose GAD or PHQ score indicates serious concerns, the patient is contacted within 24 hours, and the RUHS Crisis Response Team is called in immediately when necessary.
