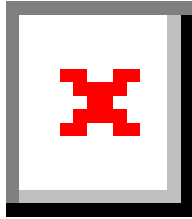

Eligibility/Requirements:

- This grant is open to nonprofit organizations, educational institutions, and governmental agencies.
- This grant aims to support Programs that align with one or more of the following topics: health, mental health, and juvenile intervention.
- The program should benefit residents in eastern Riverside County, the Coachella Valley and Palo Verde Valley.
- Funding requests can be up to \$10,000.
- Funding may be utilized to support general operating costs for the program.
- Grant periods may extend up to 12 months.

After an application is submitted, the review process takes between 30 to 60 days. If the application is accepted, a representative from your organization will be required to attend a Grants Review Committee meeting via Zoom or in person at RAP's office to answer questions the committee may have and provide any additional information or updates on the request.

The Grants Review Committee will make a recommendation, which will be considered by the Board of Directors at their next scheduled meeting.

The Rotary Club of Coachella East is proud to support youth development by sponsoring local students to attend RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) — a transformative, three-day leadership camp designed to inspire and empower high school students. RYLA provides hands-on leadership training, team-building activities, and motivational sessions that equip students with confidence, purpose, and the tools to become effective leaders in their schools and communities.

RYLA camps are held twice a year and offer a life-changing experience. However, many students in our region — particularly those from farmworker and migrant families in the Eastern Coachella Valley — face significant financial and logistical barriers that prevent them from participating. These students often attend under-

resourced schools and come from households where college and leadership opportunities may feel out of reach due to economic hardship, language barriers, and a lack of access to enrichment programs. The unmet need lies in these youths' lack of equitable access to leadership development. While students in other parts of the Coachella Valley regularly attend camps like RYLA, many promising students in the Eastern Coachella Valley are left behind simply because they cannot afford the costs of transportation, camp fees, or related expenses. As a result, these students miss out on an invaluable opportunity to build confidence, develop leadership skills, and engage with mentors who can positively influence their futures. Through fundraising and community partnerships, the Rotary Club of Coachella East is working to bridge this gap by sponsoring farmworkers and migrant youth to attend RYLA camps. We aim to ensure that no deserving student is excluded from leadership opportunities due to their socioeconomic status. By investing in these young people, we are investing in the future of our region — cultivating the next generation of civic leaders who will uplift and advocate for their communities.

Provide full funding for each student's camp registration, transportation, and supplies to ensure zero out-of-pocket costs.

Achieve a 90% completion rate of the camp experience among sponsored students.

Conduct pre- and post-camp surveys with 100% of participants to assess the impact on key leadership and personal development indicators.

Qualitative Goals:

Increase students' self-confidence, public speaking ability, and teamwork skills through immersive, experiential learning.

Foster a stronger sense of purpose and community engagement, encouraging students to pursue leadership roles in school and beyond.

Inspire participants to envision pathways to higher education, regardless of socioeconomic background.

Create lasting mentorship connections between students and local Rotarians, helping build supportive relationships beyond the camp experience.

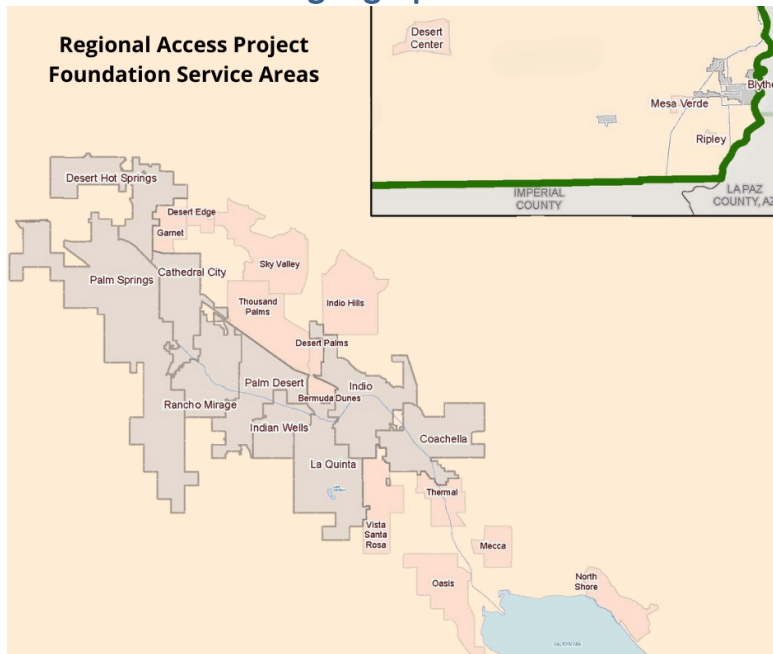

We specifically serve migrant and farmworker youth in the Eastern Coachella Valley, many of whom come from low-income, Spanish-speaking households. These students often face educational, economic, and social barriers. We estimate that 20–30 students will benefit from our leadership camp sponsorships annually, gaining access to experiences typically out of reach due to financial hardship and geographic isolation.

Measurement/Evaluation*

We utilize pre- and post-program surveys to measure leadership skills, self-confidence, and goal-setting growth. These include both quantitative ratings and qualitative reflections. We also collect feedback from RYLA facilitators and Rotary mentors to assess student engagement and participation.

We track attendance completion rates and conduct follow-up outreach to monitor long-term outcomes. Notably, some students remain connected with Rotary after graduation, volunteering at events, mentoring others, or even becoming Rotary members, demonstrating sustained impact and community investment.

Partnerships/Collaborators*

We are proud to collaborate with several partners to expand the reach and impact of our RYLA leadership program:

RAP Foundation: Provided funding (2024-2025) that allowed us to double our student participation, enabling more youth from the Eastern Coachella Valley to attend RYLA camps.

Sun Community Federal Credit Union: Supports our efforts by providing scholarship funds that help students pursue further education beyond the leadership program.

City of Indian Wells: Offers financial support that directly contributes to covering the cost of camp attendance and related expenses for underserved students.

These partnerships are essential to removing financial and logistical barriers for the farmworker and migrant youth we serve, ensuring equitable access to leadership development opportunities.

The Rotary Club of Coachella East respectfully requests funding to expand access to the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) program for Eastern Coachella Valley (ECV) students. We aim to ensure that youth from underserved communities—particularly children of farmworker and migrant families—can participate in this life-changing opportunity for leadership development, personal growth, and community engagement.

These students face numerous systemic challenges, including poverty, language barriers, and geographic isolation. Their families often work long hours in agriculture, and many students lack access to extracurricular programs or leadership development opportunities. These conditions create an opportunity gap that can limit their potential—not due to lack of talent or ambition, but due to lack of access and support. RYLA offers a transformational opportunity to bridge that gap.

The Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an immersive leadership development camp for high school students hosted annually by Rotary District 5330. Students participate in workshops, team-building challenges, and motivational activities that build self-confidence, resilience, and ethical leadership throughout a three-day weekend in the San Bernardino Mountains. Youth are encouraged to step outside their comfort zones, connect with peers from diverse backgrounds, and begin seeing themselves as leaders with the power to shape their communities.

RYLA has a proven track record of helping students discover strengths they didn't know they had. Many return home with newfound self-esteem, stronger communication skills, and a more profound commitment to giving back. The program emphasizes collaboration, critical thinking, service, and community—skills that serve students well in school, college, career, and life.

Despite the many benefits of the RYLA program, students from the Eastern Coachella Valley are often excluded due to the financial burden. Registration fees, transportation, and essential gear such as sleeping bags, warm clothing, and toiletries are usually beyond what families can afford.

For many of our participants, RYLA is the first time they have ever left the Coachella Valley—let alone spent a night away from home. This experience is a massive leap of faith for students and their families. We've seen students arrive without basic gear like sleeping bags, hygiene products, or proper shoes for the camp activities, not because they forgot—but because they didn't have them.

To ensure no student is excluded, our Rotary Club provides the following for all selected youth:

- Complete coverage of the RYLA registration fee

- Round-trip transportation from the Coachella Valley to the San Bernardino Mountains

- All necessary camping gear and personal supplies, including sleeping bags, hygiene products, warm clothing, and appropriate footwear

- Pre-camp orientations for students and parents, conducted in English and Spanish to ensure trust and understanding

- Volunteer support and on-call club advisors throughout the weekend for safety, encouragement, and continuity

The Rotary Club of Coachella East is a group of local volunteers—none of whom are paid, and many have deep, personal ties to our communities. Half of our club members were born and raised in the Coachella Valley. Many of our parents and some of our members have worked as farmworkers.

We know firsthand the barriers that children from agricultural communities face. We are passionate about making leadership and personal development opportunities available to ECV students—so they can break through those barriers and thrive. Our commitment is not just professional—it's personal.

We aim to support 10–20 students in the next RYLA cycle. These young leaders return from RYLA with the following:

- Greater self-confidence and personal vision

- More decisive leadership, public speaking, and problem-solving skills

- Increased engagement in school, clubs, and community service

- A deeper understanding of teamwork, ethics, and service

- Renewed motivation to pursue higher education and civic involvement

Many past participants have gone on to become student leaders in school (e.g., ASB officers, club founders, and volunteers), and several have returned to RYLA as youth counselors. Some have called the RYLA weekend a defining moment—sparking goals they never imagined.

We partner with high school counselors and educators to nominate students with leadership potential but lack access to enrichment opportunities. Our selection criteria prioritize need and potential over academic performance alone.

We engage families through bilingual orientation meetings, helping parents feel confident and informed. For many families, it's the first time their child will attend an overnight camp, and our relationship-building approach eases their fears and strengthens family trust.

RYLA is more than a camp—it's a launchpad for future leaders in one of the most overlooked regions of our state. With your partnership, we can expand access to RYLA, giving students from the Eastern Coachella Valley a chance to grow, connect, and believe in their potential.

We sincerely appreciate your continued investment in youth development, and we welcome the opportunity to collaborate to expand access, equity, and opportunity for the students who need it most.

To ensure the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards program is accessible to underserved youth from the Eastern Coachella Valley, the Rotary Club of Coachella East actively leverages multiple funding sources and in-kind contributions to support and expand the initiative. These include:

Morongo Band of Mission Indians – \$5,000 (Confirmed): This generous grant supports registration fees for RYLA students.

Rotary Club of Coachella East – \$3,000 (Committed): Our club members contribute directly through fundraising efforts and sponsorships. Additionally, all administrative and logistical support is provided by volunteers at no cost.

Individual Donors – \$1,500 (Ongoing): Local community members and business sponsors contribute to an RYLA scholarship fund to cover gear, supplies, and student meals during travel.

In-Kind Support: Rotary members provide donated goods such as sleeping bags, hygiene kits, and warm clothing. Some transportation is also covered through volunteer-driven vehicles.

These combined resources help us remove all financial barriers for participating students and allow us to focus on expanding outreach and support for youth who would otherwise be excluded from this transformative opportunity.

The Rotary Club of Coachella East is committed to supporting youth leadership and will continue to sustain the RYLA program beyond the grant award period through a diversified funding approach. Our sustainability strategy includes:

Ongoing Rotary Club Support: Our club allocates a portion of its annual budget and fundraising efforts for youth leadership development, including RYLA. Club members, all unpaid volunteers, contribute financially and through in-kind donations such as transportation, supplies, and logistical support.

Annual Fundraising Events: We host community-based events and campaigns to fund youth programs. These efforts provide consistent revenue to maintain and expand our RYLA scholarships.

Partnerships with Local Sponsors: We will continue cultivating relationships with partners like the Morongo Band of Mission Indians and other local businesses and foundations that share our commitment to youth empowerment.

Donor Engagement: We are developing a dedicated donor base of individuals and families interested in sponsoring students directly. Personalized recognition and student success stories help build long-term donor loyalty.

District and Regional Rotary Support: We may also apply for matching grants through Rotary District 5330 and Rotary International, which offer resources for youth leadership programs.

By leveraging these multiple funding streams and continuing to involve our volunteer network, the RYLA program will remain a core offering of our club, ensuring youth from the Eastern Coachella Valley have lasting access to this life-changing opportunity.
